Process

About Pacific Seminar III: The Ethics of Family, Work and Citizenship

In their senior year, students from all majors come together again in PACS 3, a culminating general education experience that develops students' capacities for ethical self-understanding and ethical reasoning. Based on a common course reader edited by Pacific faculty, students will

- Identify, analyze and evaluate one's own moral values and framework(s)
- Understand moral development theories and apply them to one's own moral development
- Understand and apply different moral theories to one's life and to the analysis of contemporary issues regarding family, friends, work, and citizenship
- Understand how narrative can illuminate moral development and experience as applied to
 oneself and others.

Among the course assignments, students will write an ethical autobiography and complete a narrative assignment in which they read a biography or a work of literature of ethical significance.
